# Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

## Statement of intent

Our intention is that all pupils, irrespective of their background or the challenges they face, make good progress and achieve high attainment across the curriculum, particularly in EBacc subjects. The focus of our pupil premium strategy is to support disadvantaged pupils to achieve that goal, including progress for those who are already high attainers.

We will consider the challenges faced by vulnerable pupils, such as those who have a social worker and young carers. The activity we have outlined in this statement is also intended to support their needs, regardless of whether they are disadvantaged or not.

High-quality teaching is at the heart of our approach, with a focus on areas in which disadvantaged pupils require the most support. This is proven to have the greatest impact on closing the disadvantage attainment gap and at the same time will benefit the non-disadvantaged pupils in our school. Implicit in the intended outcomes detailed below, is the intention that non-disadvantaged pupils' attainment will be sustained and improved alongside progress for their disadvantaged peers.

Our strategy is also integral to wider school plans for education recovery following the COVID-19 pandemic, notably in its targeted support through the National Tutoring Programme for pupils whose education has been worst affected, including non-disadvantaged pupils.

Our approach will be responsive to common challenges and individual needs, rooted in robust diagnostic assessment, not assumptions about the impact of disadvantage. The approaches we have adopted complement each other to help pupils excel. To ensure they are effective we will:

- ensure disadvantaged pupils are challenged in the work that they're set
- act early to intervene at the point need is identified
- adopt a whole school approach in which all staff take responsibility for disadvantaged pupils' outcomes and raise expectations of what they can achieve

## Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

1	<p>Many of our students have poor basic skills in literacy and numeracy and this is evident across the curriculum and becomes a barrier to learning across most subjects.</p> <p>Reading ages are low, particularly amongst disadvantaged pupils, this has become a real issue following the COVID-19 pandemic.</p>
2	<p>Disadvantaged pupils make less progress and attain lower than their non-disadvantaged peers. This occurs across most subject areas.</p>

4	<p>Our assessments, observations and discussions with pupils and families suggest that the education of many of our disadvantaged pupils continues to be affected by the impact of the school closures during the COVID-19 pandemic, and to a greater extent than for other pupils. These findings are supported by national studies.</p> <p>This has resulted in knowledge gaps resulting in disadvantaged pupils falling further behind age-related expectations.</p>
5	<p>Our assessments (including wellbeing surveys), observations and discussions with pupils and families have identified social and emotional issues for many pupils, such as anxiety, depression and low self-esteem. This is partly driven by concern about catching up lost learning and exams/future prospects. These challenges particularly affect disadvantaged pupils, including their attainment.</p> <p>Referrals for support remain high with a large proportion of our cohort identified as being 'vulnerable'.</p>
6	<p>Many of our pupils have struggled to access learning successfully following the COVID-19 pandemic and demonstrate a lack of aspiration and ambition, low confidence and resilience. This is particularly so with disadvantaged pupils and has a major impact across all areas of the curriculum, leading to poor attainment.</p>

## Outcomes for disadvantaged pupils

We have analysed the performance of our school's disadvantaged pupils during the 2023/24 academic year using key stage 4 performance data and our own internal assessments.

For 2024, the Progress 8 score (which is a measure of how much progress pupils at this school made across 8 qualifications between the end of KS2 and the end of KS4, compared to other similar pupils nationally) for our disadvantaged pupils was -1.04 (**unvalidated**). For Attainment 8 (which is a measure of GCSE attainment across 8 subjects) it was 30.75. See [DfE guidance](#) for more information about KS4 performance measures.

We have compared our results to national figures to help gauge the performance of our disadvantaged pupils (although these should be considered with caution as at the time of reporting changes may still occur). The national Attainment 8 score for disadvantaged pupils (FSM6) in 2023/24 was 36.8 (OACa 30.6). The national average for attainment 8 was 46.8. At the time of writing this report, the national progress measure for all students and disadvantaged students was not available

Key stage 4 data and our internal assessments suggest that, despite some strong individual performances, the progress and attainment of the school's disadvantaged pupils in 2023/24 was below our expectations.

The gap between the Progress 8 and Attainment 8 scores of our disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged pupils has also grown since the start of the pandemic. The Attainment 8 score for our non-disadvantaged was 43.46. Our analysis suggests that the reason for this is primarily the ongoing impact of COVID-19, and this is reflective of national figures demonstrating the additional impact of the pandemic on disadvantaged pupils.

We also identified that some of the approaches we used to boost outcomes for disadvantaged pupils had less impact than anticipated. However, the number of disadvantaged students securing 4+ Maths increased by 14% and the number of disadvantaged students securing 5+ Maths increased by 10%.

Attendance for disadvantaged pupils was 81.69% in 2023/24 and persistent absence was 49.80%. We recognise this higher than for non-disadvantaged and this is why attendance remains a focus on our current plan.

Our assessments demonstrated that pupil behaviour significantly improved as the year progressed,, but challenges around wellbeing and mental health remain significantly higher than before the pandemic. The impact on disadvantaged pupils has been particularly acute. This is why strategies to address this feature in the current plan for 2024/25.

These results mean that we are not at present on course to achieve the outcomes that we set out to achieve by 2024/25, as stated in the Intended Outcomes section above. We have reviewed our strategy plan and made changes to how we intend to use some of our budget this academic year, as set out in the Activity in This Academic Year section above. The Further Information section below provides more details about our planning, implementation, and evaluation processes.
