Key achievements to date:	Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Social times of break and lunch have been organised with equipment and trolleys to provide a more engaging environment for the children. Coupled with new equipment and a timetable for the MUGA the children are getting more options across a wide variety of physical activity.</li> <li>● The school has run 3 sport related after school clubs every half term. These have ensured that after school clubs are available for Years 1 to 6 every half term in a wide variety of sports from Dodgeball, Hockey, Football to running! This has engaged around 60 children each half term to participate in extracurricular activities.</li> <li>● Staff have had another year of CPD provided by the SSP link. This year the support was designated to ECT's, PGCE students and less confident teachers to help boost the subject across the school.</li> <li>● This year, the first Sports Day for 3 years was run in school for parents and guardians to visit. This provided 2 full afternoons for all KS1 and KS2 children to take part in 10 different events. There were also Sports Days for EYFS and Reception, again ran over 2 days providing fantastic engagement for the 54 children in those classes.</li> <li>● The school has replenished equipment and ensured that all equipment is age appropriate for the entire school. Along with a more organised system for both indoor and outdoor equipment.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Ensure the sustainability of sporting provision and skills beyond the sport premium funding period by developing the skills of teaching staff within the academy.</li> <li>● Ensure children have the opportunity to become more responsible for the leadership of physical activity during social times. With a sports leaders program for Year 5 and Year 6. Utilising the back part of our MUGA has an area for Sports Leaders to run activities.</li> <li>● Increase opportunities for children to be active throughout the school day, possibly morning activities or half termly fitness challenges across the school for each class to compete with prizes.</li> <li>● Organise after school clubs in line with other local schools or Outwood trust schools to provide more inter-school competitions for the children.</li> </ul>
