Why is the study of Health & Social Care important?

The Pearson BTEC Level 1/Level 2 Tech Award in Health and Social Care gives learners the opportunity to build applied knowledge and skills that show an aptitude for further learning, both in the sector and more widely. The focus is on improving an understanding of progression options so that learners who achieve one or more of the qualifications are equipped to go on to become work ready for an occupation post-16 in this important sector. Study of this sector at Key Stage 4 will complement GCSE study through providing an opportunity for practical application alongside conceptual study.

What skills will the study of Health & Social Care teach you?

You will learn and use a variety of skills in the course that are in great demand and highly valued by employers and colleges. These include using data, communicating findings and developing links between different parts of the subject. What's more, the practical transferable skills you will master during your studies such as self-reflection, communication, teamwork and problem solving will also support your progress in the present and the future.

What will you know and understand from your study of Health & Social Care?

The three components in the qualification give you the opportunity to develop broad knowledge and understanding of the Health and Social Care sector and relevant skills such as research, planning, problem solving and communication. The Tech Award in Health and Social Care will give you the opportunity to develop an understanding of:

- The stages and patterns of human growth and development
- Expected development at each life stage
- Life events and sources of support/ services for life events





- Health and Social Care services
- Essential values of care
- Roles of professionals from the sectors who are involved in supporting life events
- Definitions of health and well-being
- Factors influencing health and well-being

How does your study of Health & Social Care support you in other subjects?

This qualification is designed to be taken as part of a broad and balanced curriculum at Key Stage 4. It can be complementary learning for a wide range of subjects. You can take this qualification alongside GCSEs in EBacc subjects, English and other languages, as well as two non-core GCSEs and or other Key Stage 4 vocational qualifications.

How can you deepen your understanding of Health & Social Care?

You are encouraged to explore and develop an understanding of a range of Health and Social Care texts throughout your study which could include:

- Research specific medical conditions which relate to assessment tasks
- Develop an understanding of how all health and social care services work together
- Develop assessment writing skills, through practice assessment tasks

How are you assessed in Health & Social Care?

There are 6 assessment points each year that we term Praising Stars[©]. We assess how students at their current stage of study are on track to reach their end of stage targets which are formulated on aspirational expectation from their KS2 starting points. We make an informed prediction from our holistic assessments based on our subject mapping of expectation across the Health and Social Care curriculum.

How can Health & Social Care support your future?

Study of the qualification as part of Key Stage 4 learning will help learners to make more informed choices for further learning, either generally or in this sector. The choices that learners can make post-16 will depend on their overall level of attainment and their performance in the qualification. Learners who generally achieve at Level 2 across their Key Stage 4 learning might consider progression to: A Levels as preparation for entry to higher education in a range of subjects Pearson BTEC Level 1/Level 2 Tech Award in Health and Social Care, study of a vocational qualification at Level 3, such as a BTEC National in Health and Social care, which prepares learners to enter employment or apprenticeships, or to move on to higher education by studying a degree in theHealth and Social Care sector. Learners who generally achieve at Level 1 across their Key Stage 4 learning might consider progression to study at Level 2 post-16 in a range of routes designed to lead to work, employment, apprenticeships or further study at Level 3.
