Name of Subject - GCE A level Photography

Which Examination Specification is Studied for this Course? - AQA 7206

Why should I study this course? - Photography A Level will introduce you to a variety of experiences, exploring a range of photographic media, techniques and processes. Researching the work of other photographers and artists is an integral part of the investigating and making process. You'll produce a sketchbook / workbook / journal, documenting your research and recording the development of your own work. When you complete the course you'll be able to express ideas and link your intentions to outcomes in a confident and assured manner. This qualification will encourage you to explore and develop specialist photography skills in a creative and innovative setting. We also visit London art galleries to further our contextual understanding, ideas for presentation and to undertake a workshop.

Who is suitable to study this course? - A high proportion of students go on to study at university and then into careers in the creative arts industry. Photography links well to A level studies in Fine Art, Media Studies and Design Technology. This course can lead to career opportunities in the following areas: photographer, gallery curatorial work, arts management, teaching/lecturing, animator, TV and film roles and photojournalist.

What GCSE Qualifications Support the Study of this Course? - Art and Design and Photography, Media Studies

What are the Qualification Requirements for this Course? - Level 5 + in Art and Design is an advantage, you do not need to have studied Photography but an aptitude and interest in taking photographs is highly desirable.

How is the Course Delivered? - The course is delivered over 5 teaching hours per week and it is expected that at least a further 3 hours of independent study which can be done in enrichment time or at home, Google Classroom is used for sharing resources, assignments and online learning and assessment records, there are weekly practicals of two to three hours, DSLR cameras and printing are provided, photography sketchbooks are used for professional presentation of work as are online digital portfolios.

How is the Course Assessed?

There are two components assessed with four Assessment Objectives.

Component I- Personal Investigation (60% of the mark)- is coursework and assessed through project work and a personal project with a written assignment between 1000 and 3000 words.

Component 2-(40% of the Mark) is an **Externally Set Assignment** with a choice of themes supplied by the exam board at the beginning of February. At the end of the Externally Set Assignment you complete a 15 hour timed piece under exam conditions. Both components are internally assessed and externally moderated.

The four assessment objectives are:

A01 Develop - to develop a theme through research, investigation and experimentation.

A02 Explore - a sustained approach to media, materials and techniques.

A03 Record - detailed recording of ideas, observations and insights while reflecting critically on work and progress.

A04 Present - fully developed and meaningful realisation of intentions with connections to visual and other elements.

You receive a mark out of 96 for each component. These four areas are holistically assessed and coincide with Praising Stars reporting.


