Why should I study this course?

The course is designed to inspire students to become independent theatre makers with the transferrable skills needed to go on to higher education.

This qualification emphasises practical creativity alongside research and theoretical understanding.

Students learn through experience, seeing theatre and making theatre for themselves. Students are also introduced to a wide range of theatrical styles and contexts as they explore plays practically and devise their own performances.

The written examination is designed to allow students to demonstrate their creativity and imagination in interpreting set texts and applying independent thinking when evaluating a live theatre production.

The study of Drama and Theatre at A level can help students with a variety of skills as well as develop their creative career aspirations. Students who study this course will enhance their skills in creative thinking, teamwork, analysis, presentation skills, planning and many more.
