Name of Subject - Sociology

Sociology is the study of society and which groups make up society. It allows us to study social processes and ultimately improve the world around us with policies and a research-based understanding.

Sociologists explore issues such as crime and deviance, social stratification, culture, social mobility and changing dynamics within families.

Which Examination Specification is Studied for this Course? AQA Why should I study this course? -

If you like to question the issues that affect all of our lives and understand the factors which influence our culture and society, then you will enjoy this course. You will develop your sociological imagination which enables you to see the world from different perspectives and you will develop your research and essay writing skills.

Who is suitable to study this course? -

A level Sociology links well with Psychology and Health and Social Care as there is some crossover with common content such as research methods.

An A Level in Sociology tells future employers and universities that you have a good understanding of the social world around you, you understand different cultures and groups of people and that you have developed sound essay writing and research skills.

Sociology is particularly useful for future careers which involve working with different sections of society such as the police, social work, teaching and nursing.

What GCSE Qualifications Support the Study of this Course?

Good passes in English and Maths and any Humanity subject will prove a solid foundation for studying this course.



What are the Qualification Requirements for this Course?

All students undertaking this course are expected to have secured 5 passes at GCSE, including English and Maths.

How is the Course Delivered? -

The course is delivered by experienced Sociology specialists, Dr Turton, Mrs Wikocki or Mr Garnham. All the teachers have many years experience as teachers at A-Level in this subject. The course is delivered through four hours taught content per week and there is an expectation to support this with five hours independent study which includes homework tasks and structured revision. Students sit three, two hour exams, each worth 80 marks, at the end of the two year course:

Paper I - Education and Research Methods

Paper 2 - Family and Households and Beliefs in Society

Paper 3 - Crime and Deviance, Methods and Theories.
