Why should I study this course? -

Do you ever wonder how or why you are here? Religious Studies is the course that can create more questions than answers. The course is ideal for anyone who wants to see the world from more than one perspective. From the beginning of the course you are quickly discussing the existence of God and looking at why some people do, some do not and some people are unsure as to whether God exists. Religious Studies is not only about religion, but also ethics, morals and values that shape the society we live in. As we live in such a diverse society, it becomes even more important to have a better understanding of the people around us. Within the course there is a requirement to study one religion in-depth. You will study Buddhism and its beliefs and teachings.

It will help you debate better and challenge your own thinking. This course is ideal for anyone who wants to go out and investigate the world, who loves to find out more about some of the world's biggest religions, and who will realise why it's often difficult to make the right decisions.

What GCSE Qualifications Support the Study of this Course? Having studies Religious Studies at GCSE will be beneficial however, because it is a Humanities subject, having studied History and Geography will also benefit you. An ability to write well will also be an advantage.

What are the Qualification Requirements for this Course? Students should have a Grade 5 in English as this will help access the course.

How is the Course Delivered? - You will have 4 hours of teaching per week. Most teaching will take place in a classroom setting however there will be opportunities to use the Computer Suites when researching and writing up projects.

How is the Course Assessed?

There are two examination papers to sit at the end of Year 13. Component 1: Philosophy of religion and ethics Section A: tests philosophy of religion and consists of two compulsory two-part questions; in each two-part question the first part tests AO1 (10 marks) and the second part tests AO2 (15 marks). Section B: tests ethics and religion and consists of two compulsory two-part questions; in each two-part question the first part tests AO1 (10 marks) and the second part tests AO2 (15 marks).

Component 2: Study of religion and dialogues

Students study Buddhism for Component 2. The exam tests students' ability in relation to both AO1 and AO2. The paper is divided into three Sections:

- Section A covers the study of religion and consists of two compulsory two-part questions; in each two-part question the first part tests AO1 (10 marks) and the second part tests AO2 (15 marks).
- Section B covers the dialogue between religion and philosophy of religion; it is tested by one synoptic question from a choice of two testing AOI and AO2 (worth 25 marks).
- Section C tests the dialogue between religion and ethical studies; it is tested by one synoptic question from a choice of two testing AOI and AO2 (worth 25 marks)
