#### Why should I study this course? -

Studying Theatre studies at A- Level gives you the opportunity to be creative whilst developing analytical skills enabling you to be a confident, articulate critical thinker who can work well with others as well as independently. This course takes a holistic approach to Theatre looking at performance, design and direction as well theoretical exploration of texts. Our teaching methods are practical and we offer the opportunity to experience live theatre as an audience member as well as taking part in it as performers and theatre makers.

#### Who is suitable to study this course? -

This course is most suitable for students who have prior experience of Theatre and the study of Drama. You will need to have a good starting level of technical performance ability. An ability to be cooperative and collaborative, with very good communication skills are essential and you will need to be open minded, creative and committed. Students looking to go into a career in the Arts would benefit from this course of study but can also be an excellent choice for students who have areas of interest in design, languages, sciences and media; we often find the skills learnt on this course develop the student as a whole which is reflective in their success across their A-Level journey.

What are the Qualification Requirements for this Course?

Students need to have a level 5 or above in English at GCSE to access this course

#### How is the Course Delivered? -

This course is taught over 5 hours a week which happens in a 2/3 hour split.

There are 2 teachers who deliver the course but the general way of working is that each cohort has one member of staff that takes them through the two year course. There is an expectation that students will do independent study that reflects the number of hours delivered. This changes depending on the elements being covered. As a minimum 2 hours a week of study should be carried out. We use Google classroom to set and submit work and in the event of working remotely all lessons are delivered live by your class teacher. Practical sessions are regular and generally speaking would happen for one of the two sessions a week- You will always be notified of this so that kit can be worn/brought.

Kit consists of a plain black top, bottoms and jumper if needed and should be comfortable and allow you to move freely.

#### How is the Course Assessed?

Course Breakdown

# Component I: Drama and theatre (written)

An open book exam focusing on two areas of theatre: The Study of I set text in Year I and a further text in Year 2. The analysis and evaluation of a live performance.

### Component 2: Creating original drama (practical)

This unit focuses on the process of creating devised drama and only occurs in the second year of the course. The devised piece must be influenced by the work and methodologies of one prescribed practitioner. A working notebook will be kept throughout this unit.

## **Component 3: Making theatre (practical)**

Students practically explore and interpret three extracts (extracts I and 2 in year I and the third in year 2) each taken from a different play exploring methodology of a prescribed practitioner.

One extract will be performed and assessed at the end of year 1 and 2. Students may contribute as a performer, designer or director.

A reflective report analysing and evaluating theatrical interpretation of all three extracts is included in this unit.

- 50% of the course is assessed internally via compulsory assessments and the remaining 50% is assessed via external examination.
- Praising starts assessments happen every half term where you will be assessed for effort and attainment
