Which Examination Specification is Studied for this Course? AQA- full details of the course specification can be found at aqa.org.uk/psychology/A-level

Why should I study this course? - The AQA Psychology A level course covers a wide range of topics, including social influence (obedience and conformity); memory; attachment; psychopathology (definitions of abnormality; explanations and treatments for phobias, obsessive compulsive disorder and depression). There is a section on biopsychology, so good scientific understanding is required. Psychology is often studied alongside other science subjects, sociology, maths, criminology, but the skills being developed are transferable to almost any other area of study.

The course includes exploring different theories and perspectives in psychology, research methods and optional units in the second year of the course. Students taking this course will develop a wide range of skills: from note taking to writing extended essays; being analytical and evaluating theories and research; the ability to read and summarise studies; creating and interpreting statistical data; personal and time organisation, to balance the study of theory with practical applications of areas covered.

Who is suitable to study this course? - Psychology is a useful subject to have because it demonstrates that you have a range of transferable skills. This course develops skills that are useful in a number of jobs and professions including law, business, medicine, journalism, marketing, advertising, personnel work, management and many more. Careers specific to psychology include: clinical psychology, social work, teaching and educational psychology, health psychology, forensic psychology, sports psychology, psychiatric nursing, midwifery, and medicine. It also has relevance in other occupational areas including management, politics, advertising, and careers in law. Psychology is accepted at some universities as a scientific A Level to support some medical and science based degrees.

What GCSE Qualifications Support the Study of this Course? It is not necessary to have studied Psychology at Level 2/GCSE to be accepted on to the Level 3 Psychology.

What are the Qualification Requirements for this Course? Minimum of five grade 4's at GCSE and Grade 5 in English, maths and science.



How is the Course Delivered? - You will be taught for 5 hours per week, led by one teacher. You will be expected to consolidate learning, complete homework tasks and independent study each week. You will have access to a Psychology Google Classroom where a bank of lesson and revision resources are stored, and where written work and assessments can be submitted.

How is the Course Assessed?

The course is 100% examination based. At the end of Year 13 you will sit 3 examinations (2 hours each), each worth one third of the qualification.

Paper I: Written exam, 2 hours, 33.3% of A Level.

Introductory Topics in Psychology assesses Social Influence, Memory, Attachment and Psychopathology.

Paper 2: Written exam, 2 hours, 33.3% of A Level.

Psychology in Context examines Approaches in Psychology, Research Methods and Biopsychology.

Paper 3: Written exam, 2 hours, 33.4% of A Level.

Issues and Options in Psychology tests Issues and Debates in Psychology, Gender, Schizophrenia and Forensic Psychology.
