Why should I study this course?

Sociology is the scientific study of society. It allows us to understand social processes and to ultimately improve social policy and welfare. Sociologists are interested in social stratification, social class, social mobility, culture, religion, secularisation, law and deviance.

Families and Households – this topic addresses the relationship between the family and social structures and change. Students will debate different roles and power relationships within the family and demographic.

Education with Methods in Context – this topic addresses the functions of education looking in particular at teacher/pupil relationships. Students will debate the significance of educational policies of selection and privatisation and how this affects equality of opportunity within the education system. Methods in context is the study of research methods which are then applied to research within education.

Crime and Deviance – this topic will debate the social distribution of crime by ethnicity, gender, social class and age. Students will also address global crime such as media and crime; green crime; human rights and state crime.

Beliefs in Society – this topic will address the role of religion, ideology and science in society. Students will address the relationship between social change, social stability and religious beliefs. New Age movements and their relationship to religious and spiritual beliefs and practices will also be explored.

Who is suitable to study this course?

If you like to question the major issues affecting all our lives and to understand the factors which influence our cultures and society, then you would enjoy this course. Sociology promotes self-understanding. You will also learn to write effective essays, evaluate research and analyse information. This A Level provides a good basis for the study of Sociology and related subjects (e.g. Criminology, Administration or Law) at degree level as well as vocational courses, such as Social Work or Nursing. Even if you choose not to progress to further study in this subject, you will find the course satisfying and worthwhile.

What are the Qualification Requirements for this Course?

To be accepted onto the Sociology course you are required to have at least 5 GCSEs at level 4 and above; this needs to include English and Maths. English at a level 5 would be beneficial due to the essay nature of the course.

How is the Course Delivered?

You will be taught for 5 hours per week, led by Ms Morgan. You will be expected to consolidate learning and complete homework tasks for a further 5 hours of independent study each week. You will have access to a Sociology Google Classroom where a bank of lesson and revision resources are stored, and where written work and assessments can be submitted.

Paper 2: 33.3% written exam - Topics in Sociology – Families and Households and Beliefs in Society.

Paper 3: 33.3% written exam - Crime and Deviance with Theory and Methods.
